What Is the Object in Which Copyright Can Subsist?

The topic of this paper is the ontology of works of art and its relation to copyright law. An ontology of art works is, roughly, a theory of what kind of object a work of art is. One might summarise the concerns of an ontology of works of art by means of the following three questions: 1. To which ontological category (or categories) do works of art belong? 2. In what relationships do works of art stand to other objects? 3. What is the internal structure of a work of art?

I argue that copyright law and copyright jurisdiction provide a considerable amount of data that should be taken into account by an ontology of art works. On the other hand, I consider the question of whether ontological investigations might be relevant and helpful for copyright lawyers. Can ontological considerations help lawyers to find answers to particular hard cases? In this paper, I delineate the basic elements of an ontology of art works, and I discuss, in the light of this ontology of art, two problems of copyright connected with contemporary developments in art ("appropriation art" and contemporary popular music).
